The Music Issue

DR. JEREMY FILSELL, **ORGANIST AND DIRECTOR OF MUSIC** It has been gratifying for the choristers, and indeed the choir as a whole, to have returned to its regular liturgical and artistic life during the 2022-23 school year with pandemicinduced singing restrictions hearteningly in the rear-view mirror. The choir/school recruitment was challenged by COVID lockdowns, as was every other church music

program, and many institutions simply lost a foothold with children not returning to the musical activities in which they previously participated. However, this year we have a wonderfully strong 8th grade class to lead the way, and a goodly number of younger boys now showing great promise; the future does look bright. The silver lining to our pandemic




cloud was the church's ability to livestream all our services and concerts, and viewers continue to tune in from around the world.

While we commissioned and premiered two major new works for the choir last season, consolidating our core repertoire will remain a priority in this one as we mark the church's bicentennial. The bicentennial represents an important milestone in the life of the parish, which was founded in 1823 in the heart of Manhattan to be a beacon of Anglicanism within the increasingly busy metropolis. Saint Thomas has, since that

time, become a focus for the dignity of its worship, and the beauty of the liturgico-musical offerings within it; something worth celebrating, we hope. As we know, the parish's choir school, now the last of its kind in North America, allows the preservation of a musical standard rarely found elsewhere nowadays. Choir schools are elite (but not elitist) educational environments, but they foster transformational experiences, not only for youngsters who sing, but also for all those who hear and absorb the music they produce. Long may ours continue to flourish.

RECORDINGS


In 2021, we released the choir's first commercial recording for seven long years; an album of choral music by Gerre Hancock, marking a particularly important Saint Thomas heritage (Hancock's music will also feature in our first concert this year). Last summer, the choir made further recordings which are to be released this Fall. The first constituted the Sacred Music of William Byrd, marking the 400th anniversary of his death in 1623. This is a recreation of the Catholic Mass for the Feast of Corpus Christi (Dies Sanctissimi Corporis et Sanguinis Domini Iesu Christi), with Byrd's Mass and Motets sung in Latin. We digitized a recording originally released in analogue form on LP of the choir from the years of Gerre Hancock's leadership. It is thus fascinating to make a comparison, not only of the two sides of Byrd's extraordinary musical coin, but also with the choir today and that of forty years ago. At the time we recorded Byrd, we also set down an album of Christmas music, to be released this coming December. Next February, we plan to record music by New York composer Calvin Hampton (1938-1984), and by Englishman Kenneth Leighton (1929-1988). Of noteworthy mention here is also the commercial recording made of last year's Head Chorister, Frankie Segger, before his voice inevitably changed. It is rare that we experience a boy treble who sings with a musical maturity belying his years, yet once in a while, we do.

CONCERTS

By the time this newsletter reaches you, the full choir will have finished a tour in the US for the first time in six years. We look forward to sharing highlights of our time in Sarasota, Nashville and Atlanta in future issues. This year, for our Christmas on Fifth concert, the choristers will collaborate for the first time with the Juilliard Music Advancement Program Ensemble, an organization which nurtures young instrumentalists in the New York area who demonstrate a commitment to musical excellence. MAP provides full-tuition scholarships to its students and maintains a rigorous curriculum, performance opportunities, and guidance from an accomplished faculty. As we mirror such attributes at Saint Thomas Choir School, the time is ripe for us to collaborate with artistic institutions such as this in this great city. In March, we will develop another new artistic partnership with conductor Justin Bischof and his Modus Operandi Orchestra, in a concert of Rachmaninoff's Third Piano Concerto and Francis Poulenc's sublime setting of the Stabat Mater sung by the choir in the second half. Then in May, we will celebrate the centenary of the birth of Peter Hallock in a concert featuring his music. Hallock was a hugely important figure in Episcopal church music who initiated the great Compline tradition during his tenure at St. Mark's Cathedral, Seattle, WA. Hallock's intensely spiritual music is unusual, often otherworldly, and during his lifetime, he was thought of as the west coast counterpart to our own east coast Gerre Hancock at Saint Thomas. Hallock's music will be paired with some of the finest of Vaughan Williams, Randall Thompson, and Richard Strauss.

In June, our choir year is slated to end with a tour to the UK (the first visit across the pond since 2006), and we are currently due to sing at Canterbury Cathedral, York Minster, Westminster Abbey and St. George's Chapel Windsor. Details about our trip abroad will be available in a future issue.



It will be a busy musical year for the boys and they no doubt deserve a little leisure time in between their music making and academic pursuits. So, as an avid squash player, I am delighted to learn that for the first time, the Saint Thomas boys will have the chance to learn and play squash this coming year!



Saint Thomas Girl Chorister Course

This summer the Saint Thomas Girl Chorister Course welcomed 31 girls aged 11 to 18, hailing from 13 different states, the District of Columbia, and Toronto, Canada, for nine days of music making, learning, and fellowship. Working with Guest Music Director Jared Johnson of Grace Episcopal Cathedral in San Francisco and our world class team of music and residential life staff, the choristers sang five choral services throughout the week–a weekday eucharist for the feast of St. James, two weekday evensongs, and both eucharist and evensong on the final Sunday of the course.

This year's repertoire encompassed a range of periods and styles, with a particular emphasis on the works of Jessica French, whom we were thrilled to welcome as Composer in Residence this year. The



choristers had the honor of presenting the world premiere of Ms. French's anthem "At Heaven's Proclamation," a joint commission by Saint Thomas Church and Trinity Cathedral, Columbia, South Carolina. Ms. French attended rehearsals throughout the week to support and encourage the choristers and led the choristers in a descant writing class which culminated in a completed descant that the choristers sang at their final Choral Evensong service on Sunday. STCS alumnus Trevor Weston stopped by the Choir School on Tuesday during the course to speak to the choristers about his time at the Choir School and his career as a composer. The Choristers sang his anthem "Rivers of Living Water" during the Sunday morning Eucharist Service on July 30th. The choristers enjoyed singing the music of composers they had met and learned from during the course.

When not singing, course participants took classes in music theory, music history, and theology, as well as private voice and organ lessons. Organist Janet Yieh from Church of the Heavenly Rest in Manhattan led our music theory classes, taught organ lessons to 16 of our choristers, and played several voluntaries for our services throughout the week. Dr. Jacqueline Horner-Kwiatek, currently

on faculty at Princeton University, returned as our vocal coach this year and also taught music history classes and directed our choristers in singing a choral introit by Hildegard von Bingen at Wednesday's treble-only evensong. Mother Alison Turner acted as course chaplain once again and not only taught our theology classes, but also led our nightly compline services by candlelight in the school library. A special highlight of this summer's course was singing compline in one of the small walking tunnels in Central Park. The choristers won over some new fans to compline with this "pop-up" service in the park!

There was plenty of time for fun and relaxation, too: on Monday evening Residential Life Coordinator (and former STGCC Chorister) Claire Griffin organized a scavenger hunt in the Choir School neighborhood for the choristers, with the winning team receiving elevator privileges for a day; on Tuesday evening we enjoyed a pizza party on the rooftop of the rectory; on Thursday we visited the Central Park Zoo; on Friday we saw a Broadway musical; and on Saturday we brought back a chorister-favorite outing from previous years, a visit to the Met Cloisters.

This year saw the implementation of a new Choral Scholar/Intern program. Four college age choristers joined us for the course this summer to assist with rehearsals, activities, and residential life. These students were selected after a rigorous application and interview process and received a small stipend, 2 voice lessons, and instruction in conducting during their 11 days at Saint Thomas. This summer's Choral Scholars/Interns were Becca Lipsky (Music Education major at Bucknell University), Kate Falvey (Music Education major at University of South Carolina), Alessandra Craig (recent graduate of AMDA), and Meredith Wallace (Music Education major at St. Olaf College). Ella Parker-Harley (Art major at Temple University) joined us as a junior intern. We look forward to continuing this new program next summer and aspire to include 1-2 Organ Scholars in addition to our Choral Scholars.

The STGCC would not be possible without the support of Saint Thomas Church and Choir School and our wonderful staff. Thank you to all the staff mentioned above and to Course Organist Nicolas Haigh, Course Nurse Jennifer Johnson, Housemother Karen Wentling, School Chef Glenn Trickel and his

staff, our Choir School housekeeping and security staff, and special thanks to Organist and Director of Music Jeremy Filsell and Head of School Chris Seeley for their ongoing support of the STGCC.

We are pleased to announce that the dates for next year's course will be July 20–28, 2024. The course is open to girls ages 12–18 with some choral experience.

MUSICAL STUDIES MAKS ADACH

This year, the practical skills the boys learn throughout their time in the rehearsal room will be complemented by activities in the Musical Studies classroom. The curriculum is three-pronged and seeks to give the boys a grounding in theory (including the building blocks of free composition), music history, and practical musicianship. As with last year, the 6th Grade will work on putting together the so-called "Magic Board of Fun," a visual timeline that will display every single piece of music they will sing in choir during the academic year. The 8th Grade will also begin working on various exciting projects concerning the lives of important composers from the history of Western Music. For the practical musicianship portion of the curriculum, all the grades will be improving their sight-singing by working through collections of Renaissance motets which are perfectly suited to firming up their "interval instincts." It is set to be a great year in Musical Studies!

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC DR. REGINA YUNG

Saint Thomas Choir School is a unique and special place. Being surrounded by a group of talented, energetic, and inquisitive boys makes teaching incredibly enjoyable. Convocation 2023




